A Message from Head Start

It is an ever changing world, and our program is faced with many challenges due to COVID-19. We operated summer programming for 71 Head Start children in Broome and Tioga. We reopened Early Head Start to all enrolled children in both counties. We learned many things through this process, including: increased sanitizing practices; child wellness screening; staff wellness screening; ratios of teacher to children to ensure social distancing happens; changes to food services from family style dining to staff assembling meals for children.

We are preparing for the new program year that begins on September 1st for Early Head Start children and their families and September 9th for Head Start children and their families. Program will look different, and many program activities that were previously held in person will be offered remotely; these include Program Orientation, home visits, parent site committee meetings, teacher home visits, and parents/teacher conferences. Classrooms will be reduced to ten Head Start and six Early Head Start participants, and the other children will participate virtually. Some centers will have hybrid classrooms that are a combination of in person and virtual for their in person children.

As we move through this program year, we will remain open to shifting and changing as we need to, so that our children, families, and staff are healthy and safe.
